INPUTS

- Foundation resources, including funding and staff
- High-quality Jewish education programs
- High-quality Jewish educators with skills and experience to work with young Jews
- Jewish youth and young adults
- Youth and young adult social networks (Jewish and non-Jewish)

ACTIVITIES

Proven Jewish Experiences

- Financial subsidies to enable young Jews to participate in proven Jewish experiences
- Improved quality of proven Jewish experiences
- Educational trips to visit historical Jewish locations

Emergent Peer-Based Jewish Experiences

- Peer educators to serve as emerging Jewish leaders
- Experimental peer education programs
- Social networks to increase access to Jewish life and learning
- Opportunities for select groups of well-networked young Jews to receive training and become Jewish peer educators
- Opportunities for young Jews in Jewish peer-educators' networks to strengthen their relationships with and learn from other peer educators

Emergent Intensive Jewish Experiences Led by Trained Jewish Educators

- Experimental ongoing and immersive Jewish education programs led by trained Jewish educators

Jewish Content-Focused Experiences Centered Around Parents

- Production and dissemination of new high-quality Jewish content for parents to use with children

OUTPUTS

- Number of peer educator-led Jewish education programs funded by the Foundation
- Number of professionally-staffed and parent-centered Jewish education programs funded by the Foundation
- Number of slots available for and filled by young people in proven and experimental Jewish learning experiences
- Number of Jewish young people who choose to serve as Jewish peer educators
- Level of density and connectedness of social networks among Jewish peers
- Number of young Jews who have meaningful Jewish learning experiences facilitated by peer educators
- Number of Jewish parents and caretakers who choose use high-quality Jewish educational content funded by the Foundation with their children

SHORT-TERM OUTCOMES

- Strengthened Jewish peer networks that lead to more youth engaged in Jewish life and learning
- Increased quality of Jewish learning experiences for youth and young adults
- Better alignment between ongoing Jewish learning opportunities for youth and young adults
- More youth and young people who have effective Jewish education and networking skills and see themselves as peer educators
- Increased Foundation understanding of the effectiveness of emergent Jewish education programs
- More disseminated models for successful Jewish learning
- More young Jews participating in effective and compelling Jewish learning

LONG-TERM OUTCOMES

- More and continued engagement of Jewish youth and young adults in Jewish life and learning
- Ongoing engagement in Jewish life and learning among youth and young adults who move on from Foundation-supported programs
- Increased prevalence of Jewish youth driving the engagement of their peers and taking a lead in making Jewish life and learning more central and relevant to their lives
- Increased meaning and relevance of Jewish thought, culture, history and tradition for Jewish youth and young adults

IMPACT: There is an increasing number of youth and young adults that are engaged in relevant and meaningful Jewish learning and creating and sustaining Jewish networks.
